What is Outdoor Science School?

Outdoor School is a week long overnight outdoor science and community experience for all Oregon 6th graders. Outdoor School (ODS) staff plan exciting outdoor science lessons, field experiences, and community building and use the help of High School volunteers (called "Student Leaders") to make it all happen. Our staff come from a variety of backgrounds, including classroom teachers, Forestry Service employees, biologists, and more. They share their unique experiences with their students. High Schoolers attend an "in town" training where our Volunteer Facilitator Team introduces the ODS model and basic child management skills. When they arrive at our sites, they spend an entire day learning and practicing the specific lessons and activities they will be leading. Facilitated by trained ODS staff, High School volunteers then lead cabin groups, field study lessons, and community building activities with 6th grade students

Outdoor School is an opportunity for students to practice teaching, learn to lead, gain confidence, and develop valuable life skills. At the end of their week at Outdoor School they will have earned over 100 volunteer hours, received over 20 hours of training applicable to state early childhood credentials, a job or college reference, countless memories, and unforgettable experiences. Student Leaders also receive written and oral feedback about their strengths and areas for growth concerning their leadership and teaching, a tool that can be used to prepare themselves for college or their future careers.

All Outdoor School volunteering opportunities are excused absences - High School students receive time to make up their missed assignments. In many schools ODS counts for Service Learning hours and a Career-Related Learning experience, things they may need to receive their diploma. All volunteers who complete a week of Outdoor School are also eligible for up to 2 college credits through PCC and a state certification in childcare from the Oregon Registry Online.











What is ORO?

Oregon Registry Online is a program of the Early Childcare Division that tracks and supports professional development of early childhood educators. In an effort to increase the education of the states childcare workers, ORO tracks and rewards employees for increasing their Registry Step through continued Education.

Benefits of ORO for High School Students Include:

- If you choose to work at a childcare facility and work at least 20 hours a week, you can receive \$125 for being a step 3 or above by submitting this form.
- Students in an Early Childhood Education program can earn "Credit for Prior learning" -9 to 15 college credits depending on the school at a discounted rate (often \$10 per credit).
- Many ECE and Childcare employers give higher wages for each step an employee has on the registry

Oregon Registry Steps

The Oregon Registry Steps include Step 1 through Step 12. Each step represents training and education in Oregon's Core Knowledge Categories.

There are three pathways for moving up: Degree, Credential, Certificate (DCC), College Course Credit (CCC), and Community Based Training (CBT). These tables show the minimum requirements for each step by pathway. The first row of each table shows the pathways available at each Step.

Using ODS to Advance your ORO Step:

To earn a Step 2:

- Initial ODS training
- Volunteer 1 week with ODS

To continue to a **Step 3**:

Volunteering with ODS for just 1 week can earn a Student Leader 100+ volunteer hours and 22 credit hours for ORO. Those 22 hours make a Student Leader eligible for a Step 2 on the Oregon Registry!

A second week of volunteering plus a few hours of FREE online trainings makes a Student Leader eligible for a Step 4. With a Step 7 (possible to obtain completely for FREE using the trainings listed in this packet) can be used for "Credit for Prior Learning" at most community colleges in Oregon and can save students time and money towards their ECE or ED degrees!

Benefits of Student Leading for Outdoor School

Founded in 1968, Outdoor School (ODS) serves up to 11,000 sixth-graders each year in learning about science, experiencing nature, and having fun in natural areas and at residential camps in NW Oregon. It wouldn't be possible without the hundreds of high school students who serve as Student Leaders for our program. These older students volunteer their time to teach science lessons, lead cabin groups, and develop their own professional skills. Our staff often say the Student Leaders get more out of Outdoor School than the sixth graders. Benefits of being a Student Leader include:

- 1.) College and Career Readiness: Outdoor School prepares students for college and career interviews through our training and feedback sessions. Each Student Leader is mentored throughout their time at Outdoor School by, and receives written evaluations from, two specific Outdoor School staff members each week. High school students learn about application processes and interviews with our registration system. Student Leaders also get a first hand look at many careers such as forest management, teaching, and environmental science. They also have the option to submit their outdoor school training to the Oregon Registry to earn credentials in childcare and be eligible for education scholarships and shorten the length of an Early Childhood Education degree.
- 2.) Volunteer Hours and Community Involvement: Student Leaders help shape their community. They positively affect the experience of the 6th grade students. The science and team building activities they teach are often the most memorable parts of Outdoor School for 6th graders. Student Leaders serve as educational role models for 6th graders and often say their experience at ODS has changed their lives for the better. Student Leaders earn 20-100 volunteer hours in a week (depending on school criteria).
- 3.) Leadership and Personal Development: Student Leaders get specific personalized training on leading, teaching and working with others, and get practice in building their skills and confidence. They bond and form relationships with their peers and build resilience through the challenges they face together. They receive daily feedback from ODS staff on their performance and written evaluations at week's end that highlight their strengths and areas for improvement. Staff work with each Student Leader to set goals and to create plans for achieving them.
- 4.) College and High School Credit: PCC offers 2 college credits for Student Leaders who complete a week at overnight ODS. Many high schools offer service learning credit or elective credit for participating in ODS; many also accept it as a Career Related Learning Experience (CRLE).
- 5.) Resume Building: Being a Student Leader is valuable experience that high school students use when applying to competitive colleges, jobs and scholarships. Being a Student Leader demonstrates a high school student's work ethic, willingness to learn, and teamwork abilities. By the end of their week, Student Leaders can list activities they planned and executed and the skills they gained from teaching 6th graders. Outdoor School staff are often available to write recommendation letters or to serve as resume references.
