

# Pathways to Teaching

Across our region, school districts are working to recruit more racially and linguistically diverse teaching staff that will better reflect the students and communities they serve. Research shows academic and social emotional benefits for students who are taught by educators that mirror their racial, cultural, and linguistic identity. However, there is a severe shortage of bilingual and racially diverse educators.

To address this need, Northwest Regional Education Service District launched the Diverse Educator Pathways program, which includes pathways for school district staff who aspire to become a teacher. If none of these pathways apply to your situation, but you are still interested in teaching, fear not! These are not the only pathways available for teacher licensure. All pathways may have testing requirements for entry into and completion of the program. Please check with your chosen program to make sure you meet all requirements before enrolling.

# Which pathway is right for you?



# I want to go back to school and earn a bachelor's degree or higher

This pathway is often referred to as the "traditional pathway to teaching" and ends in an individual receiving a teaching degree. It takes between four to six years to complete.



# I am a district employee and I have an associate degree

This pathway is designed for district staff looking to become teachers. This pathway takes between two to four years to complete.



## I am a district employee but my degree is not in teaching

This pathway is designed for district staff with a baccalaureate (bachelor's) degree. This pathway can take between one to three years to complete.



## I want to change careers and I have a bachelor's degree or higher

This pathway is for those who are specialized in a career technical education (CTE) subject area but aren't employed by a school district. This route can take one to two years to complete.

Graduate with your bachelor's and/or master's degree, along with your teaching license

Enroll in a CTE licensure program

Graduate and complete TSPC requirements

Receive professional CTE license
